PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The start of Term 3 has seen our students return back to the “new normal” of Level 2 COVID restrictions affecting the school’s operation. Please see below what these restrictions mean for our school:

COVID-Safe School Operations

Overview

Level 1
School operating in a COVID-safe COVID-normal way

- Schools can operate in a COVID-normal way
- Students and staff not at school should they have to remain at home
- Parents, carers and visitors are allowed to enter
- COVID safety plans required in line with NSW Health advice (such as large gatherings or events)
- Students are encouraged to bring their own lunch, books and school performances allowed in line with NSW Health guidance

Level 2
COVID-safe restrictions on activities and non-essential visitors

- All staff must wear a mask
- Visitors are welcome on an invited basis (including parents and carers)
- Staff identified as vulnerable supported to work from home
- Activities such as singing, cheering, cheering, books and school performances are not permitted
- Assemblies must have COVID-safe practices in place and no parent/guardian are allowed

Level 3
COVID-safe; further restrictions on activities and non-essential visitors

- Wear a mask requirements
- Introduction of staggered breaks and reduced mixing of student groups
- Activities such as singing, cheering, cheering, books and school performances are not permitted
- No assemblies
- No excursions

Level 4
Learning from home encouraged, schools are open

- Students are encouraged to keep their children at home, with no exception
- School incursion plans to support continuity of education for all students learning from home

- Inter-school sport in the with community sport guidelines
- Community use of live with broader health settings
- Local government areas and other areas of NSW operational
- Community Language Schools guidance
- NSW Health advice

- Exclusions within Local Government Area only, and strongly recommended to be isolated and within building distance
- Further detailed guidance available on the Department's website

- Where in indoor settings in schools, students and staff are required to wear a mask
- Indoor settings in schools, masks or face coverings are strongly recommended for all staff and all students in Year 7 and above

Where students and staff are at school, Level 1 guidelines apply, except:

- No community use (except every child needs one)
- No inter-school sport
- No school-based learning
- Students and staff are required to wear a mask

Where in indoor settings in schools, students and staff are required to wear a mask

- Indoor settings in schools, masks or face coverings are strongly recommended for all staff and all students in Year 7 and above

At 17 July 2021

Uniform - At the end of last term, we implemented our uniform policy and require all students to be in full school uniform. The students have responded well and the majority of students now attend in full school uniform each and every day. The image of the school has significantly improved as have the student’s engagement levels with school. For students still not in uniform, phone calls home from Year Advisors and Deputy Principals will be made to ensure all students can attend each and every day in uniform.

Thursday Early Departure (Week A - 5, 7 & 9) - To ensure the safety of all students the following procedures have been put in place from next Thursday, 12 August for our early finish:

- All students with local addresses in the East Nowra, Nowra, South Nowra and Wollongong areas will have a personalised early leavers pass with their name and address indicated. At the conclusion of the school day, these students will exit via the school gates and show their cards to the Deputy Principals stationed at the gates. **ALL** other students will remain inside the school gates to be supervised by staff rostered on. The library is also available for extra study and catch up work.
- Exceptions to the above: Any non-local student who brings a note each early Thursday from a Parent/Carer will be permitted to sign out and be collected by their Parent/Carer. These students show their notes to the Deputy Principals stationed at the exit gates. Students are NOT permitted to sign out with a note and then return to school to catch school bus transport home. Students who present a note must be collected by a parent and guardian; school transport home will not be accessible to these students who return to school.

Thank you for your ongoing support with these arrangements. These have been put in place to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all our students.

Our Year 12 students will commence their Trial HSC exams during next week, Week 5. They have been working hard and their results will be a reflection of the effort and attitude they have displayed over the last two years. During this time, they have all displayed an enormous amount of resilience to persevere with their studies and this will only build on their strong character and ensure they experience success post school. The Trial HSC accounts for 30% of their school assessment and is their final practice of exams before they commence the HSC in Term 4, 2021. Our Year 12 students completing practical subjects such as Industrial Technology and Visual Art, are also in the process of submitting their major marks for HSC marking.

These projects take an enormous amount of effort and dedication to complete, and I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate both the students and staff on their efforts. We are still preparing and planning for a Graduation Ceremony and formal but, the details of these events will be governed by what restrictions are in place regarding COVID-19 and social distancing.

I would also like to invite all parents to our next P & C meeting to be held at Shoalhaven High School. This meeting will take place Thursday 12 August at 4.30pm in the front meeting room of the old Administration office. All parents are welcome to join the P & C and their input will help shape the direction of Shoalhaven High School in the future.

All the staff at Shoalhaven High School would like to express our ongoing thanks and gratitude to our school community for the support they have shown the school over the past 9 months. The support from our community and the value they place on our students education is a sign that Shoalhaven High School students will always “aim higher” and experience the success of which they are deserving.


FREE CALLS FROM TELSTRA PAY PHONES


YEAR 11 CONSTRUCTION





LIBRARY DISPLAY










JUNIOR IM

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
NEW BLUE SMILEY BOXES



Bring Your Own Technology

Positive Choices

- 1. Students putting phones on silent and putting them away in bags or in the facility provided by teachers, if they are not required for the lesson. Other devices are also put away, if this is requested.
- 2. Students following teacher instructions, so that they are using devices appropriately during the lesson.
- 3. Students showing staff their work if they are using devices, whenever they are asked to do so during the course of the lesson.

The following are examples of positive uses for devices in lessons that your teachers may access in classes:

- research activities which involve the use of internet access.
- note taking, video making for projects and assessments.
- photographing notifications of tasks and work not completed on boards.
- recording the progress of work in practical classes.
- using the device to make notes / due date entries/ excursion/ test notifications – student diary/ organiser.
- timekeeping/ stop watch for speeches/ calculator.
- using SRN, One Note, Kahoot or other appropriate software to allow student responses/ organise tasks.
- teacher directed quizzes.
- directions and storage.
- recording and storage of multimedia tasks.
- submission of tasks via email.
- accessing ABC iView, educational apps.
- recording information whilst on excursions.

Negative Choices

- 1. Students not putting phones in bags, the facility which may be provided by staff in classes or in a place acceptable to staff, and not turning them off, if they are not being used for the lesson.
- 2. Students not having 'tids ajar' on laptops, or not removing earphones when requested to do so by staff.
- 3. Students refusing to use technology in accordance with teacher instructions.

This includes:

- Students texting or calling others on mobiles during class time.
- Students refusing to show staff their work on the technology to complete work.
- Students passing mobiles to others for inappropriate use or not handing phones back to the teacher when going to the toilet.
- Students playing games on their device during lessons.
- Students using technology to bully, harass, offend or threaten others – includes illegal filming/ photography = serious offence!

Being able to use technology in class is the teacher's choice, not the student's choice!
There are consequences for any student who breaks the rules.



Health

NSW Health is ensuring that students are safely vaccinated at school during COVID-19

- Information for parents/guardians

NSW Health has been working with education authorities to implement additional measures to ensure that students in Year 7 and 10 can be safely vaccinated during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Program background

In 2020 NSW Health is offering the following vaccines:

YEAR	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV)	2 doses at least 6 months apart
	Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa)	1 dose
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY	1 dose

While the school vaccination program has been disrupted due to low student attendance, students are progressively returning to school over the coming months.

Additional measures

NSW Health has implemented additional measures based on expert clinical advice to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- health screening of nurses before clinics
- pre-vaccination screening of students
- physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance & observation area
- ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum allowed
- enhanced hand hygiene by nurses and students
- enhanced environmental cleaning of all surfaces

What parents/guardians should do

Parents/guardians should ensure that students with influenza-like symptoms do not attend school and are tested as soon as possible (www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/symptoms-and-testing). There is no need for parents/guardians who have given consent for their child to receive vaccinations at school to take any action. Parents/guardians who have not provided consent can contact their local public health unit on 1300 066 055 or their school for advice on how to provide consent for vaccination.

When students will be vaccinated

Public health units are arranging clinics with schools so that vaccinations can be given to students as soon as possible.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time

- ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- gives students time to greet their friends before class
- reduces classroom disruption.

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g. attending a funeral.

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.





If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.

My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

- Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

- Application to the Children's Court - Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a *Compulsory Schooling Order*.

The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

- Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

Families have the option to attend one or all of these sites. If you choose to attend the first meeting could you please arrive to the first scheduled site before 9.30am so we are able to begin on time.


