A Local School Reference Group is also a key feature of this strategy and its key role is to co-plan and codesign initiatives with the Executive Principal and staff in delivering programs that best meet the needs of the students while reflecting the key deliverables of the strategy and the school's strategic improvement plan."

EARLY DEPARTURE

Dear Parent/Caregivers

The NSW Department of Education updated their COVID-19 guidelines on the 29/01/2021. The guidelines for the mixing of students and having whole school indoor events remain the same as they were in Term 4. As a result we are still not able to hold whole assemblies for the foreseeable future.

Thursday Early Departure (Week A -3 5, 7 & 9) - Due to the fact we cannot hold whole school events, we have Respect, Responsibility, Safety & Participation maintained an early finish, but, this has moved to Thursday, Week A. I have been in talks with Transport NSW to negotiate an early pick up for our bus students but at the present time our bus schedule remains the same. To ensure the safety of all students the following procedures have been put in place from Thursday 11th February for our early finish:

- All students with local addresses in the East Nowra, Nowra, South Nowra and Worrigee areas will have a personalised early leavers pass with the name and address indicated. At the conclusion of the school day these students will exit via the school gates and show their cards to the Deputy Principals stationed at the gates. ALL other students will remain inside the school gates and be supervised by staff rostered on. The library is also available for extra study and catch up work.
- Exceptions to the Above: Any non-local student who brings a note each early Thursday from a Parent/Carer will be permitted to sign out and be collected by their Parent/Carer. These students show their note to the Deputy Principals stationed at the exit gates.

The early finish does NOT impact on curriculum and teaching time. As a school we value the time for our assemblies so we can communicate school expectations and celebrate whole school achievements.

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BRYAN ETHERIDGE

It was great to welcome ex-student Bryan Etheridge (1998 - 2003) back to Shoalhaven High School! Bryan spoke to the students in Support classes in Work Education lessons about his working life since leaving SHS.



Bryan spoke about volunteering his time with the Rural Fire Service (RFS) where he has been an active member for almost 20 years. He has participated in many courses through the RFS to improve his skills and has worked on incidents both within NSW and interstate. Bryan has also had paid employment at a couple of local clubs which began after he completed work experience at Worrigee Sports Club. Bryan shared some of the challenges he has faced during his working life and how he has overcome them.

We thank him for his time to attend and speak to students as a guest speaker.

BELL SHAKESPEARE

On Thursday 6 May, Year 10 English and Year 11 Drama students had the fantastic opportunity to watch The Players from Bell Shakespeare performing Macbeth: The Rehearsal. With sensational guest appearances by our students as the wicked sisters, King Duncan and Banquo's ghost, The Players took the audience through the process of rehearsing a play, taking direction and exploring the depths of character and plot.

The best way to tackle Shakespeare's plays is to see them live on stage. The Players' performance formed a great basis for Year 10's study of Shakespeare's Macbeth later in the term, covering all the key moments of the play as Macbeth and his wife unravel. For Year 11, it was a valuable chance to gain insight into the rehearsal process and elements of staging. And the general summary from our students? "It was great!"

Thanks to The Players for spending time with us and introducing our students to the joys of live theatre.



STEM OUTREACH DAY

On the first Wednesday this term students from 7K and some of Mr Woods Lego Robotics students were invited to participate in a STEM activity day organised by Macquarie University. Jacinta Caruthers and her Outreach Team from the university brought a stack of Lego EV3 kits and iPads so that the students could have a taste of designing and building their own robots.

The students were not given any instructions but were instead allowed to study some pre-built robots so that they could try and put their own design together. Some students carefully followed the same designs

and some took the basic idea and came up with their own design. Some very interesting designs were created.

The students were then challenged to program their robots to move around the floor given various challenges such as moving along a path or around various obstacles, or to map out a particular shape. Some of the more adventurous students then adapted their robots to have extra moving parts such as lifting arms to enable their robot to interact with its environment.



Macquarie's aim is to enable more students to engage with STEM activities and build more handson confidence with modern technologies. They are the Australian arm of the FIRST organisation and encourage schools and community groups to participate in the different levels of competition that FIRST organise. Mr Woods' Lego Robotics class will be competing in the FIRST Lego League later in the year but we are keen to generate interest amongst our older students to participate in the FIRST Robotics Challenge, in which teams have to design and build their own full-scale mechanical robot (think ABC's Robot Wars) that must compete against other robots to complete challenges. Jacinta's team brought along their own robot to show to our students.

The final task of the day was to have the students race their robots against each other with one major difficulty. They first had to remove the wheels and then build replacements using the remaining lego pieces. Again, some very interesting ideas were generated and it was great fun watching the robots perform as the students wanted, or, conversely,

misbehave completely and wander off in the wrong direction.

Thanks very much to Jacinta, Chantelle and Jaye. We had a lovely day and are very much looking forward to the Outreach team returning later in the year.













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INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The big news from the Industrial Arts Faculty is that we have purchased a Koenig laser cutter and engraving machine. The Koenig laser machine is a safe and user-friendly tool for cutting and etching a variety of materials. With the ability to cut plastic, woods, leather, paper and etch glass.

The machine has a bed size of 600mm x 500mm which is a large enough space to work with reasonable size projects. The introduction of the laser cutter will make practical technology classes more active and interactive then ever. Students are now developing their ideas, creating proof of concept and prototypes for products and innovations that have real-world purpose.

This machine will help accommodate students at Shoalhaven High School with the curriculum requirements and assist in linking school to industry. We are planning as a faculty to utilise the machine from Year 7 to produce personal logo designs on their chopping boards to Yr 12 where it is endless where they can apply this process – from model making, prototyping, to detailed inlays in table tops.

We are excited as a faculty by the possibilities this machine creates. Rather than just producing a simple job the traditional way, recent trends in the use of laser cutters in education have been to create a project with a more holistic approach.

South Coast Sport

It has been a busy few weeks on the hockey field for our school captain Sam Wright-Smith. Sam spent the Easter holidays in Launceston where he competed in the Hockey Australia Under 18 National Championships, winning a gold medal as captain of the NSW State team. Sam then returned to school for one day before he was off to compete in the NSW CHS Hockey Championships at Kurnell. As captain of the South Coast Marlins, which he has played in since Year 3, Sam led the team through their pool rounds

undefeated, finishing the tournament with a 2-0 win in the final against Sydney North. Not only did he take home a gold medal from this championship, but he was recognised as Player of the Tournament, and was also selected in the NSW CHS Opens team which will compete at a tri series against students from Catholic and Independent schools in Term 3. Following on from these wins, as a result of his performance at Under 18 Nationals, Sam was named in the NSW Under 21 state squad, and has also been selected in the Hockey Australia Futures Program, which identifies athletes who display the potential to be included in future Kookaburras squads to compete at the Olympics and Commonwealth Games.

Sam has just found out that he has made the Under 21 State Hockey team. He will play Nationals at Moorebank. Well done!







NSW Health is ensuring that students are safely vaccinated at school during COVID-19

Information for parents/guardians

NSW Health has been working with education authorities to implement additional measures to ensure that students in Year 7 and 10 can be safely vaccinated during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Program background

In 2020 NSW Health is offering the following vaccines:

YEAR	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV)	2 doses at least 6 months apart
	Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa)	1 dose
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY	1 dose

While the school vaccination program has been disrupted due to low student attendance, students are progressively returning to school over the coming months.

Additional measures

NSW Health has implemented additional measures based on expert clinical advice to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- · health screening of nurses before clinics
- pre-vaccination screening of students
- physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance & observation area
- ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum allowed
- enhanced hand hygiene by nurses and students
- enhanced environmental cleaning of all surfaces

What parents/guardians should do

Parents/guardians should ensure that students with influenza-like symptoms do not attend school and are tested as soon as possible (www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/symptoms-and-testing). There is no need for parents/guardians who have given consent for their child to receive vaccinations at school to take any action. Parents/guardians who have not provided consent can contact their local public health unit on 1300 066 055 or their school for advice on how to provide consent for vaccination.

When students will be vaccinated

Public health units are arranging clinics with schools so that vaccinations can be given to students as soon as possible.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities? What if my child has to be away from

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time

- ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- gives students time to greet their friends before class
- · reduces classroom disruption.

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g. attending a funeral.

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

· Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

Application to the Children's Court
 Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order.

The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.
