COMMUNITY COMMUNICATION

Dear parents and carers

A big thank you for your continuing efforts in supporting our school and students during the pandemic – especially prioritising safety and learning. The Premier and Minister for Education have announced changes to school settings for the remainder of Term 1. These updated settings were developed in close consultation with NSW Health and key stakeholders to ensure we continue to keep our schools open for learning, while keeping up with changing community settings.

The updated settings include:


- We will continue the use of rapid antigen tests (RATs) for twice-weekly testing of students and staff until Friday 25 February.
- From Monday 28 February, we will move to symptomatic testing. Tests are to be used at your discretion such as if your child is symptomatic or there are cases in their class. Our school will provide each student and staff member with 8 tests per student and staff in schools or 10 tests per student and staff in support classes.
- Beyond that, students and staff can access PCR tests or buy their own rapid antigen tests as these are now freely available and accessible in the community.
- FOR SECONDARY Masks will continue to be required indoors for all school staff, volunteers and visitors including parents and carers, and students in secondary schools until Friday 25 February. From Monday 28 February, masks will no longer be

mandatory for students in **Year 7 and above** or staff. However, those who wish to continue to use them will be supported to do so.

- FOR WORKERS SUPPORTING STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY In line with community settings, workers who support our students with disability in SSPs, support units and some mainstream classrooms will be required to wear masks while working with students.
- From Monday 28 February, visitors can be allowed back on school sites regardless of their vaccination status. Our school will consider activities such as assemblies, parent-teacher meetings and other gatherings in the coming days. We will let you know if these can proceed with our school in a COVID-smart way. All visitors are asked to follow our usual sign-in and sign-out process.

Our school will continue to ensure our layered COVID-smart measures are in place, including vaccinations, maximising natural ventilation in learning spaces, continued good hand hygiene practices and enhanced cleaning.


2022 NOWRA SHOW




PHONES OFF AND AWAY





Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities? What if my child has to be away from

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time

- ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- gives students time to greet their friends before class
- · reduces classroom disruption.

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g. attending a funeral.

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

· Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

Application to the Children's Court
 Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order.

The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.

School Zone Offences As of 1 July 2021

To avoid receiving a fine, when you are dropping off or picking up children, please observe the road rules associated with signs around schools. These are a guide only and are subject to change without notice.



SPEEDING OFFENCES

Speeding increases the chance of a crash resulting in severe trauma and injury. It's not worth the risk.





BUS ZONE

Do not stop here for any reason. A 3us Zone allows buses to drop off and bick-up passengers safely.

Penalty Exceeds Notice \$352+2 Demerit Points



MOBILE PHONE USE

You must not drive while using a hand-held mobile phone in a school zone.

Penalty Notice

\$464+5 Demerit Points



U-TURNS

You can be penalized for cangerous J-Turns in a school zone.

Penalty Exceeds Notice \$464+3 Demerit Points



CHILDREN'S CROSSINGS

Orange children crossing Tags and hand-held stop signs must be obeyed If you stop on or near a children's





DOUBLE PARKING

\$352+2 Demerit Points



NO PARKING

Stop here for up to two minutes or crop off and pick-up passengers. You must always stay within three metres of your venicle. No pathing zones provide a sife place to drop off or pick-up children.

Penaly Exceeds Notice

\$196+2 Demerit Points



NO STOPPING

Do not stop here for any reason. No Stopping zones keep signt lines clear for drivers and children. Drivers also must not stop at the side of a rose marker with a continuous YELLOW LINE. This line means the same as no stopping. Pealty Exceeds Notice

Slow Down in school zones and keep our kids safe

With school returning for Term 1, 2022, please remember to take extra care in school zones and on our roads.

Here are some safety tips for travelling to and from school:

Remember the school zone 40km/h speed limit and look out for any children

- that may be about

 Park safely and legally, even if it means you must walk further to the school

 Be aware of pedestrians on or near road crossings.

 Drop your children off and pick them up on the school side of the road in the designated school drop off and pick- up area.

 It is safest for children to get out of the car through the Safety Door, away from passing traffic. This is the rear foropath side door of the car.

 Watch for flashing lights on buses. This is to let you know that children may be crossing or about to cross the road.

 A 40km/h limit applies when school bus lights flash.

Dangerous driving behaviour around schools puts children at risk. Model safe and considerate behaviour for your child – they will learn from you.


Higher fines and demerit points also apply to certain driving and parking offences committed within school zones.

Council Parking Rangers and Police patrol and enforce the road rules in school zones to ensure the safety of local children.







